This book shifts the focus from Critical Regionalism towards a broader concept of 'Transcultural Architecture' and defines Critical Regionalism as a subgroup of the latter. One of the benefits that this change of perspective brings about is that a large part of the political agenda of Critical Regionalism, which consists of resisting attitudes forged by typically Western experiences, is 'softened' and negotiated according to premises provided by local circumstances. Advocates of better methods for fusing the arts and urbanism combined to launch an alternative design competition in 2015. 'The Next Helsinki?' helped to amplify a public debate about the role of culture in civic health and economic development that has consequences far beyond the Finnish case-study. In addition to cataloging the hundreds of entries from dozens of countries, this volume includes essays by leading urbanists, artists, and architects about the significance of the competition and the principles that inspired it.
