In 1968 the *Bee Gees* publish the song "When the Swallows fly" with clear references to *The Happy Prince* tale. An

animated film adaptation of the story was produced in 1974, starring Glynis Johns as the swallow and Christopher Plummer as the Prince. Adaptations have continued over the years, the most recent in 2019; Viki produced an adaption of the manga "Zattai Kareshi" by Yuu Watase.
